Executive summary

Portfolio Performance

The Inflation Response Multi-Asset Fund posted negative absolute returns and underperformed its benchmark (Institutional share class, net of fees) over the quarter. Positive contributions from the Fund's U.K. and Eurozone breakeven inflation positioning and a tactical allocation to Gold were offset by detractors from its bottom-up Commodities and Gold strategies, exposure to Danish covered bonds, Eurozone instrument selection, and curve positioning within U.K. interest rates.

Portfolio strategy

TIPS: We express an underweight position in duration overall, mainly sourced via Japanese rates. We express an underweight to U.S. interest rates as persistent inflation is likely to lead to more rate hikes. We maintain an overweight to breakeven inflation in the U.S., as long-term inflation expectations are still well anchored. We moved to a neutral stance in U.K. breakeven inflation as a result of volatility from pension plan selling.

Commodities: We look to take advantage of structural sources of alpha in commodities and continue to implement structural index relative value trades.

Gold: We tactically adjust gold allocation given changes in real yields.

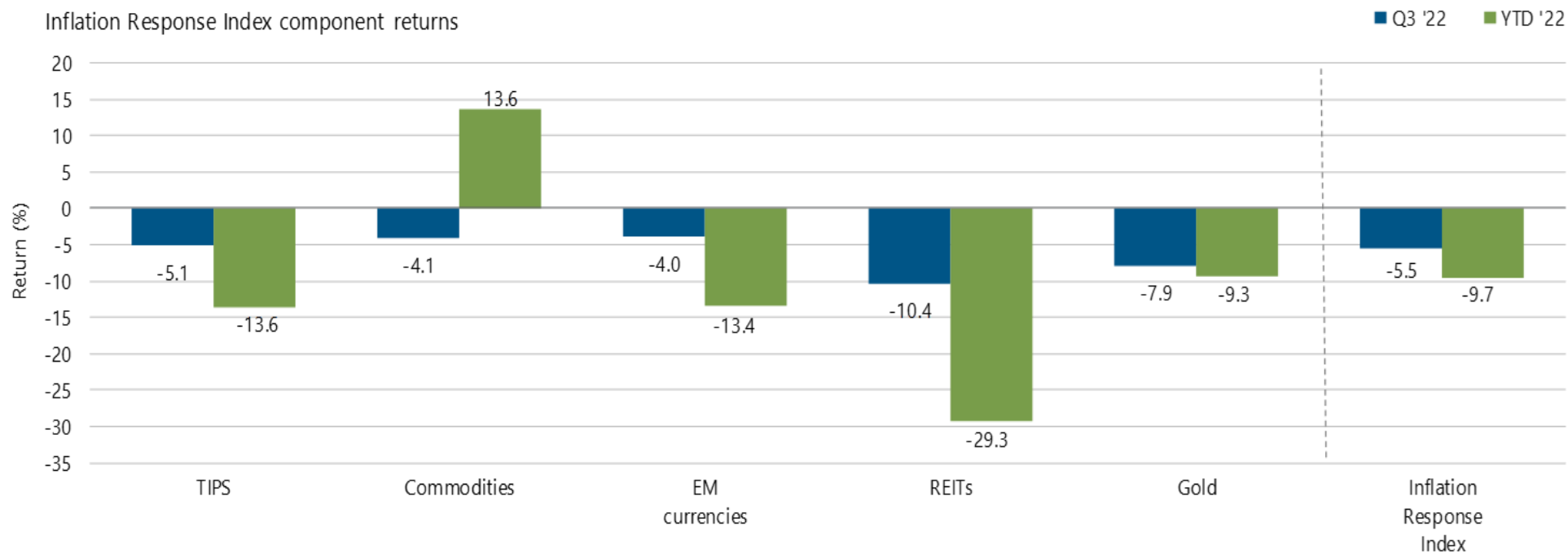

Quarter in Review

Real assets delivered negative returns in Q3

The Inflation Response Index returned -5.48% for the quarter, with all five underlying assets posting negative returns

- Treasury Inflation-Protected Securities (TIPS) delivered -5.1% returns due to sharply higher real yields, although some of the impact was offset by strong inflation accruals.
- Broad commodities moved lower over the quarter driven by recessionary fears and continued economic uncertainty
- EM currencies faced a volatile quarter as hawkish Fed rhetoric and heightened risk aversion drove substantial U.S. dollar strength over the quarter
- REITs delivered negative returns in Q2, as broader equities sold off
- Gold prices delivered negative returns as real yields rose sharply higher over the quarter

Market Summary

Q3'22: Real yields rose sharply while inflation expectations moderated

The Inflation Response Multi-Asset Fund posted negative absolute returns and underperformed its benchmark (Institutional share class, net of fees) over the quarter. The Fund's U.K. and Eurozone breakeven inflation positioning and a tactical allocation to Gold were additive to performance. Bottom-up Commodities and Gold strategies, exposure to Danish covered bonds, Eurozone instrument selection, and curve positioning within U.K. interest rates detracted.

U.S. TIPS

U.S. TIPS returned -5.14%, as represented by the Bloomberg U.S. TIPS Index, and underperformed comparable nominal Treasuries. Markets continued to re-price real rates sharply higher as the Fed implemented multiple rate hikes over the quarter. Breakeven inflation rates generally moved lower as broader risk-off trading, increased odds of a recession in the near-term, and weaker commodities prices weighed on inflation expectations.

Commodities

Commodities delivered negative returns for the quarter, driven by losses across sectors. Oil prices fell 23%, settling at \$88/barrel driven by heightened recessionary fears. Natural gas prices rose over 25% driven by cooling demand in the U.S. and supply risks in Europe. Precious metals fell in response to a hawkish Fed and rising real yields. Agriculture commodities were flat. Challenging growing conditions and geopolitical tension placed upward pressure on grain prices, but were offset by losses in soybeans.

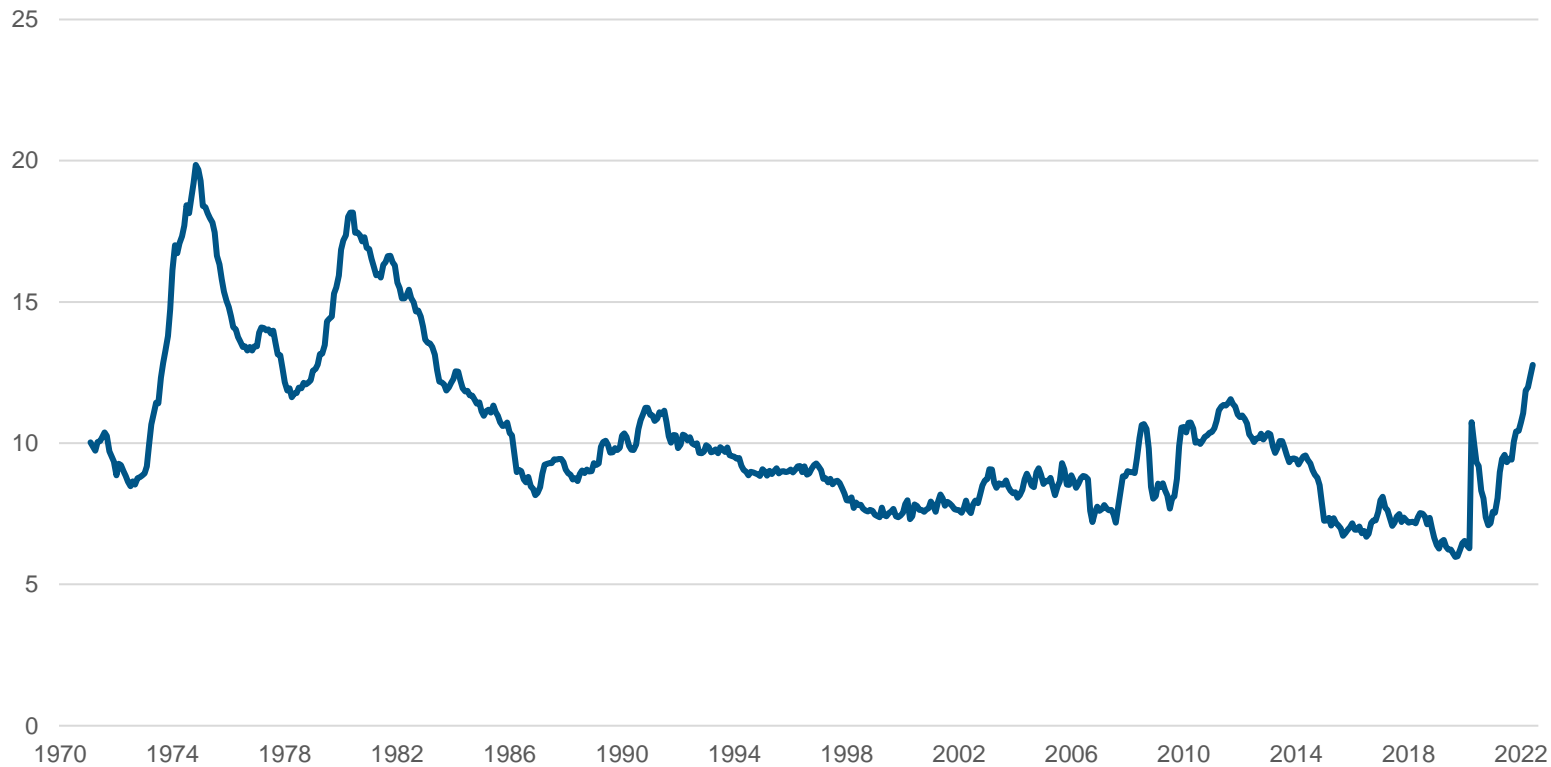
REITs / EM currencies

REITs continued to fall over the quarter, in line with the broader equity sell-off, as rate hikes and uncertainty around real estate valuations weighted on market sentiment. The Dow Jones U.S. Select REIT Index returned -10.37% over the quarter and -29.32% year-to-date, underperforming the S&P 500 over both periods. REITs posted negative returns across all sectors, with Storage and Factory Outlets REITs leading the pack while Data Centers, Healthcare and Cell Towers REITs lagged. EM currencies faced a volatile quarter as hawkish Fed rhetoric and heightened risk aversion drove substantial U.S. dollar strength over the course of the quarter.

Portfolio Outlook

Strategic outlook

Our baseline forecast is for shallow recessions across developed markets, especially in the euro area and the U.K., which face disruptions from the war in Ukraine. U.S. real GDP will also likely experience a period of modest contraction. Meanwhile, core inflation rates that are above central bank targets now appear more entrenched, and although headline inflation is still likely to eventually moderate meaningfully over our cyclical horizon, it now looks likely to take more time. The combination of higher unemployment and stubbornly above-target inflation has put central bankers in a tough spot, but their overall actions to date suggest they are squarely focused on bringing inflation down. In the U.S., for example, we expect the Fed will raise its policy rate to a range of 4.5%–5%.

Key strategies

Interest rates / breakeven inflation

We maintain an underweight duration position overall, primarily sourced in Japanese rates as macroeconomic conditions are likely to pressure the Bank of Japan into softening yield control measures, leading to an asymmetric payoff opportunity. We express an underweight to both U.S. and Eurozone rates as persistent inflation is likely to lead to more rate hikes. We continue to be selective within curves and securities depending on prevailing valuations and market events.

Currency positioning

We currently remain close to home in FX exposure though will continue to seek opportunities from overshoots and undershoots that provide attractive risk-reward profiles and the ability to diversify sources of return.

Active commodity strategies

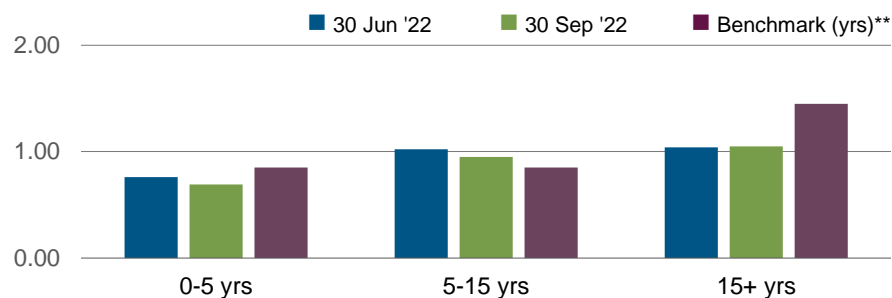
We are implementing a number of broad basket relative value views based on structural risk premia in commodities. The opposing forces of slowing economies and continued supply constraints create significant uncertainty in the outlook for commodity prices. As such, we remain modestly overweight in overall commodity exposure. Given the contribution of commodities to overall inflation and their influence on central bank policy, the case for using commodity exposures as a hedge for inflation risks has rarely been stronger.

Active REIT strategies

We see attractive opportunities in Gaming and Cell Towers, driven by favorable structural characteristics, as well as secular tailwinds from digitalization and data consumption. We also favor Manufactured Housing and Single-Family Homes, driven by favorable demand/supply dynamics and low housing affordability, which should benefit the rental market.

Average effective maturity is a weighted average of all the maturities of the bonds in a portfolio, computed by weighting each bond's effective maturity by the market value of the security.

"Bend-but-not-break" refers to credits that PIMCO would not expect to default in a credit-stressed environment.

Beta is a measure of price sensitivity to market movements. Market beta is 1.

Breakeven inflation rate (or expectation) is a market-based measure of expected inflation or the difference between the yield of a nominal and an inflation-linked bond of the same maturity.

Carry is the rate of interest earned by holding the respective securities.

The terms **"cheap"** and **"rich"** as used herein generally refer to a security or asset class that is deemed to be substantially under- or overpriced compared to both its historical average as well as to the investment manager's future expectations. There is no guarantee of future results or that a security's valuation will ensure a profit or protect against a loss.

CPI is the Consumer Price Index.

The **credit quality** of a particular security or group of securities does not ensure the stability or safety of an overall portfolio. The quality ratings of individual issues/issuers are provided to indicate the credit-worthiness of such issues/issuer and generally range from AAA, Aaa, or AAA (highest) to D, C, or D (lowest) for S&P, Moody's, and Fitch respectively.

Dividend yield is represented by the weighted average coupon divided by the weighted average price.

Duration is the measure of a bond's price sensitivity to interest rates and is expressed in years.

Effective duration is the duration for a bond with an embedded option when the value is calculated to include the expected change in cash flow caused by the option as interest rates change.

Forward curve is a function graph that defines the prices at which a contract for future delivery or payment can be concluded today.

Information ratio is a ratio of portfolio returns above the returns of a benchmark to the volatility of those returns.

Like-duration Securities are calculated by the index provider by comparing the index return to a hypothetical matched position in the security.

The **Option Adjusted Spread (OAS)** measures the spread over a variety of possible interest rate paths. A security's OAS is the average return an investor will earn over Treasury returns, taking all possible future interest rate scenarios into account. The OAS is the net spread over the swap curve that will on average be earned if the security is held to maturity.

"Risk assets" are any financial security or instrument that are likely to fluctuate in price.

Risk premia is the return in excess of the risk-free rate of return an investment is expected to yield.

Roll yield is the yield that a futures investor captures as their long position in a futures contract converges to the spot price.

"Safe haven" is an investment that is expected to retain or increase in value during times of market turbulence.

The **SEC yield** is an annualized yield based on the most recent 30 day period.

Tracking error measures the dispersion or volatility of excess returns relative to a benchmark.

To relate the price sensitivity of ILBs to changes in nominal yields, yield beta is applied to nominal changes to arrive at a price sensitivity of ILBs to changes in nominal rates. A **yield beta** of 0.90 implies that if nominal yields move 100 basis points, real yields will move 90 basis points. ILBs with long maturity may respond differently to changes in nominal rates than shorter maturity ILBs.

The distribution yield for monthly paying Funds is calculated by annualizing actual dividends distributed for the monthly period ended on the date shown and dividing by the net asset value on the last business day for the same period. The distribution yield for quarterly paying Funds is calculated by taking the average of the prior four quarterly distribution yields. The quarterly distribution yields are calculated by annualizing actual dividends distributed for the quarterly period ended on the most recent quarterly distribution date and dividing by the net asset value for the same date. The yield does not include long- or short-term capital gains distributions.
